## Do you need medical help or advice?



### Pharmacy

Your local pharmacy team can provide expert advice and treatment without a prescription or need for an appointment.

### Evening and weekend GP appointments

Search online for GP hubs in your borough.

### NHS 111

If you need urgent medical help, call 111 or visit 111 online. It's free and open 24/7.

### Mental health

If you need urgent help call **111** or visit **111 online** and select the mental health option.

### Dentist

If you need emergency or urgent dental care, call **111** or visit **111 online**.

## Free medicines for common conditions

### Are you eligible for free medicines from your local pharmacy?



If you're on a low income you may be able to get free medicines for certain common health conditions from a **participating pharmacy**.



The free medicines scheme (or the Self-Care Medicines Scheme) supports people to manage everyday health conditions through their local pharmacy and potentially avoid a visit to their GP.

#### Get free medicines for conditions such as:

- Athlete's foot
- Back pain
- Constipation (aged over 12 years)
- Contact dermatitis
- Diarrhoea
- Indigestion
- Earache
- Fever/headache
- Haemorrhoids
- Hay fever and allergies
- Head lice
- Minor injuries
- Nappy rash
- Ringworm
- Scabies
- Teething
- Threadworm
- Vaginal thrush
- Warts and verrucas

In some cases, this service may be limited to three consultations in a three-month period.

## Who can get free medicines?

You may be able to get free medicines if you live in Barnet, Camden, Enfield, Haringey or Islington are on a low income and are in one of the following groups:

- ✓ People on Universal Credit who are eligible for free prescriptions
- ✓ People on benefits that make them eligible for free prescriptions, such as:
  - ✓ NHS Low Income Scheme with a valid HC2 certificate
  - ✓ Income Support or income related Employment and Support Allowance related
  - ✓ Income based Job Seeker's Allowance based
  - ✓ Tax Credit exemption certificate
  - ✓ Pension Credit (Guarantee Credit)
- ✓ People who are homeless, with a homelessness letter from the local authority
- ✓ Young people aged 16-18 in full time education, part time education or an accredited apprenticeship
- ✓ Children under 16 with a parent who qualifies for the service

**! Please note, being exempt from prescription charges does not automatically qualify you for this scheme, unless one of the above categories also applies to you.**
